The New TUJ

Initiative with Showa Women's University
Building to Open in Fall 2019

Showa Women's University (SWU) and Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ) have agreed to share a campus at SWU's current location in Setagaya-ku, Tokyo. TUJ will move its entire operation from its current locations in Minato-ku, Tokyo by September 2019 to a planned six-story building on SWU's campus. The agreement to share a campus is the first of its kind between Japanese and American universities and marks an unprecedented step in the globalization of Japanese institutions of higher education.

The initiative will allow SWU students to take courses and receive credits at an American university without leaving Japan. TUJ and SWU students are currently participating in a credit transfer program as part of an initial Memorandum of Understanding signed in 2016. The universities plan to discuss the development of additional programs including joint degrees and collaborations in extra-curricular student clubs and activities. Joint workshops and research projects will be also developed for faculty and staff.

TUJ's undergraduate enrollment has exceeded 1,000 since 2016; a record amount since its founding in 1982. The new campus project will help alleviate crowding at TUJ's current location while allowing for continued expansion in student numbers.

The initiative is also expected to enhance the academic offerings of both schools and create a unique dual-school, multi-national campus in the heart of Tokyo. SWU has been a strong proponent of internationalizing higher education, particularly since 1988 when it opened a satellite campus in Boston, Massachusetts to provide its students with a U.S. study abroad option. By partnering with TUJ, Showa Women's University hopes to further advance the globalization of its own campus and programs.

The student body at TUJ is drawn from over 60 countries. This population will add a depth of

diversity to SWU's campus that is largely Japanese nationals. Additionally, the presence of TUJ's male students at SWU, historically a women's college, will add a new dimension to its campus population.

TUJ is the oldest, largest and leading foreign institution of higher education in Japan. In 2017, the school marks its 35th year of providing unique educational, academic and research opportunities to students and faculty from around the world. With the opening of the original Japan Campus in the early 1980's, Temple University was in the vanguard of global education. The new campus project, and the burgeoning relationship with SWU, places Temple University and TUJ once again at the forefront of the movement to internationalize higher education.

An Update from the Dean

Now, finally, we can announce to the world TUJ's plans to have a new building on the campus of Showa Women's University beginning in the summer of 2019! This facility will replace both Azabu Hall and Mita Hall, and will house all existing TUJ operations.

The TUJ, Temple U, and Showa Women's University (SWU) teams have been working on this for a full year and I have been waiting for the day when we could tell all of our faculty, staff, students and supporters that, after 20 years, we are finally moving to a building that is built to our design for education purposes, that will bring all TUJ operations under one roof, and which will be located on a real college campus. The move comes at a very important time as our undergraduate student body is now approaching 1,200 students and there is not much more room to grow at our current location.

But this move is much more than just a move from one facility to another. Our partnership with SWU is the perfect example of the idea that if globalization is driven by technical advances that make it easier for us to travel and communicate across borders, then international relations is about the people who make those communications and do that traveling. This is all about educating TUJ and SWU students to be good global citizens who can comfortably interact with people from other social, economic, religious, cultural and political backgrounds.

The Japanese American relationship is a great example of how dissimilar people can learn to collaborate and cooperate. It is an historic example of former bitter enemies becoming the closest of friends and allies. This could only occur through Japanese people and American people communicating: getting to know, understand, and appreciate each other. What we are doing will help carry on that tradition to a new generation. By bringing students from Japan, America, and from around the globe to one place with these two universities, we have created the foundation upon which we can educate a new global generation by providing knowledge, understanding and, most importantly, the experience of communicating across all national, religious, ethnic and cultural boundaries. This partnership will become one of the great initiatives in Japanese and American higher education.

So, what will the partnership look like? Well the most obvious is the new building. It will be 6 stories tall and have a floor space of about 8,831 square meters (8,831 about 95,000 sq. feet), with a large open atrium design on the first floor that will contain a student lounge, cafeteria and art gallery space. The building will be across a narrow street from the main SWU campus and accessible directly from the Sangenjaya subway station. In addition, TUV students will have access to amenities on the SWU campus made available to them, while SWU students will be able to use the TUV campus as well.

The interaction between TUV and SWU students will be supported by the physical proximity of the two campuses and by the other collaborative programs that TUV and SWU will develop. TUV and SWU already have an MOU for academic exchange, but by the time TUV moves on to the SWU campus we will have an

academic partnering program that will allow SWU to complete two years of their education at TUV with the goal of attaining degrees from both institutions. The academic relationship will also support collaboration among SWU and TUV faculty.

Collaborative academic and administrative programs, close proximity, and joint usage of facilities on each location will allow for student formal and informal interactions and collaborations. For example, we envision that student clubs from the two organizations will want to work with each other. Art, fashion, and design projects undertaken by students from both institutions can be displayed together. Sports clubs can compete against each other.

Finally, I want to give a shout out to the leadership of SWU. This partnership could only work because SWU is a very forward-looking Japanese institution that is willing to leverage their relationship with TUV, the only fully-operating foreign university in Japan, to support the development of their own international programs by increasing their diversity and increasing the number of English-language content courses available to their students. SWU has already gotten a great start in both areas through their Global Business and International Studies programs. Also, SWU is one of the few Japanese universities to have a full campus overseas, Showa Boston, and we can foresee even broader collaboration between Temple University, SWU, TUV and Showa Boston.

There are also many other initiatives going on at TUV but of course none will have as big an impact as the SWU partnership. So please watch this space over the next few years as I keep you up to date with developments in the SWU partnership, as well as our other initiatives.

2017 Commencement



The 2017 commencement ceremony was held on Sunday, June 4 at the Shinagawa Prince Hotel, Tokyo. A total of 277 students from TUJ's undergraduate, graduate and doctoral programs celebrated in a combined event that brought together family, friends, alumni, and faculty to formally mark the occasion.

Attendees also included Temple University President Richard Englert and Provost JoAnne Epps visiting from Main Campus. Mr. Jason Hyland, Charge d'Affaires of the U.S. Embassy in Tokyo, offered the formal remarks.

The ceremony in Tokyo was an official part of the 130th commencement of Temple University that occurred earlier in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania on May 11th.

In his keynote address, Mr. Hyland reflected upon his experiences in the foreign service and prevailed on graduates to continue their study of foreign languages and culture, no matter their professional field. "I urge you to treasure your network of people and invest in it. Take the time to make connections, value them and stay in touch," he added.

Two graduating students, Daniel Hart, B.S., from the U.S.A. and Megumi Yen, LL.M, from Japan gave speeches on behalf of their fellow graduates in the undergraduate and graduate

In 2017 Temple University, Japan Campus (TUJ) celebrates its 35th year of providing unique educational and research opportunities to students and faculty from around the world as the oldest, largest and leading foreign institution of higher education in Japan.

To mark the occasion a series of public events have been organized during the fall 2017 academic term including an Anniversary Symposium entitled, "Developing a Successful Overseas Branch Campus: TUJ Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow."

TUJ was established in Tokyo in June 1982 as the Japan campus of Temple University, a U.S. comprehensive public research university located in Pennsylvania. Temple University was the first foreign university to realize the

importance of having a presence in Japan at a time when the country was reaching the pinnacle of international prominence following three decades of postwar economic growth.

Temple's example was soon followed by many other universities. Today, TUJ is the only foreign university undergraduate and graduate branch campus remaining from the original 1980's wave of institution building. It has persevered with Japan through the country's travails from the collapse of the bubble era and subsequent "lost decade" of the 1990s, to the tragedy of the March 11, 2011 Great East Japan Earthquake and Tsunami.

That TUJ remains in Japan, where others have faltered, is a testament to Temple University's commitment to Japan and to international higher education. In partial recognition of this commitment, TUJ won formal recognition by the Japan Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology (MEXT) in February 2005 and was officially designated a Foreign University, Japan Campus.

In June 2017, TUJ announced a new initiative with Showa Women's University (SWU) to share a campus in Setagaya-ku, Tokyo. TUJ will move its entire operation from its current locations in Minato-ku, Tokyo by September 2019 to a dedicated six-story building on SWU's existing campus.

This agreement is the first of its kind between Japanese and American universities and marks an unprecedented step to promote the globalization of Japanese universities, and re-affirms the commitment of Temple University to Japan.

A new chapter in TUJ's 35-year history begins.
